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President's Message

Greetings, CNYPA members! Looking back on my time as CNYPA president, I have appreciated the opportunity to reflect on the concept of the "citizen psychologist" and how we as CNYPA members can strive to use our expertise for the greater good. We have great potential to benefit our communities by responding to social challenges and sharing knowledge gleaned from science and practice to inform the public in meaningful ways. As the current APA president, Jessica Henderson Daniel, has voiced, psychology is one of the only professions whose scope of expertise is wide enough to inform initiatives, policy, and laws affecting nearly every aspect of our lives.

I am proud of CNYPA's work to inform the public and advocate for positive change and I hope that we challenge ourselves to do more of that work. Our members participate in NYPSA's annual Lobby Day to educate potential sponsors of legislation about issues affecting mental healthcare and CNYPA is pleased to have two early-career psychologists who are fellows in NYSPA's Leadership Institute. CNYPA also communicates with state representatives directly to provide input on legislation; for example, the Board recently issued a letter opposing a bill that would allow individuals with master's-level training in school psychology to be fully licensed as psychologists in New York.

Additionally, we should strive to be an organization of active citizen psychologists in our local community. I would like to highlight an issue on which CNYPA affected changed by speaking out in support social justice in Syracuse. Last year's Fright Nights at the Fair unfortunately featured an attraction titled "Insane Asylum." The Board was concerned about how this upsetting portrayal of inpatient or residential treatment would serve to both stigmatize people with serious mental illness and trivialize their often challenging experiences as entertainment. We therefore composed a letter of concern to the fairgrounds director, asking that this attraction be omitted in future years, and were pleased to receive an apologetic and positive response from him indicating that the request would granted. A review of this year's Fright Nights advertisement confirms the change, with friendlier selections such as *Jurassic Dark* and *The Revenge of "IT."* Although perhaps a small contribution, the messages we communicate have the potential to be passed from person to person, influencing future choices that make our community safer and more aware.

As psychologists we have the potential to provide useful input on wide-ranging, critical issues affecting quality of life for our neighbors, such as gun violence, education, disease prevention, and sexual assault, to name a few. We are often situated in positions where our voices are sought and heard, and I will look forward to continue finding ways that we can take advantage of those opportunities as an organization.



Headlines from the hill

Notes of Interest from the Psychology Department at Syracuse University

- Four students in the department's clinical psychology program and three in the school psychology program have submitted applications for the APPIC match process this year. Good luck to all of those who have applied!
- The department just hosted its first Diversifying Psychology Weekend, which was designed to prepare talented racial minority students for graduate school by providing an experience to learn about the admission process, network with faculty and graduate students in Psychology, and get acquainted with the psychology programs at SU. The weekend was a resounding success as we received over 100 applications and funded over 20 qualified applicants to come to our weekend (some traveled as far as Puerto Rico to attend)! The department is hopeful to receive graduate applications from many of these qualified candidates!
- Joseph Ditre, Emily Zale, and Lisa LaRowe were invited to write a review paper, titled "A Reciprocal Model of Pain and Substance Use: Transdiagnostic Considerations, Clinical Implications, and Future Directions", which was accepted for publication in the Annual Review of Clinical Psychology. Pain and substance use are highly prevalent and co-occurring conditions that continue to garner increasing clinical and empirical interest. The authors integrated converging lines of evidence to propose a reciprocal model in which pain and substance use are hypothesized to interact in the manner of a positive feedback loop, resulting in the exacerbation and maintenance of both conditions over time. Two important clinical implications of this model are that pain may motivate substance use and serve as a barrier to quitting, and that ongoing substance use could interfere with pain treatment. Clinicians and researchers would likely benefit from assessing both pain and substance use behaviors when conducting research or providing treatment for either condition.

CNYPA LISTSERVE MIGRATION

It is no longer feasible to have Syracuse University host our CNYPA listserve. Therefore we have decided to migrate our listserve over to Google Groups. Many organizations such as ours are using Google Groups to manage their listserves, including the NY State Association of Neuropsychologists (NYSAN).

We have created the new listserve and we will migrate CNYPA members over to it automatically once they *renew* their membership for 2019. All new CNYPA members will also be automatically added. You do not need to do anything other than provide the email address you want to be used for the listserve when you renew your

membership online. We will then shut down the old listserve in mid-March 2019. You will be given plenty of warnings to renew your membership in order to be added to the new listserve. We will also give you a chance to test it out before we shut down the old one, and we will send several reminders about the new listserve email address and how to post (which will be as simple as posting to the current listserve, just changing the email address). We are hoping this will be a seamless process, but rest assured we will be taking care of any issues that arise from the transition.

NYSPA NOTES

NYSPA has had an eventful year. Both our President and our Executive Director resigned last Spring. Herb Gingold, Past President, stepped in and has done a wonderful job, assisted by Alan Hack, President Elect, who will become President in January. The Executive Committee hired an interim Executive Director, Marsha Spector. She has many years' experience as ED of a non-profit, and currently specializes in interim portions. Meanwhile, a search committee is being formed to find our next permanent ED. The central office is now functioning well and if you call, the phones will be answered by staff rather than by the answering service that was in place for several months previously. The office re-staffing is place and one former staffer has returned. We have also re-retained our old firm of auditors. Some of you may have heard of a potential office move; this will not occur.

Meanwhile, NYSPA held a convention in NYC in June. (We can look forward to a non-NYC convention in June 2019). Services to members have continued.

Our legislative committee has been very active. A parity bill passed both houses of the legislature. We continue to work with a coalition of several professions to push for a PLLC bill, which will allow non-physicians to form practices with physicians on an equal basis. Several other issues, including RXP, continue to be pursued. We will also do more to convey to legislators psychologists' ability to serve as experts on various issues, rather than focusing solely guild issues of psychology.

The Addictions Division produced a White Paper on Opiates, which can be read at the NYSPA website.

Our representative to APA reported on the dues structure change you may have seen in your current renewal notice. There is no longer a separate "Practice fee", although services will continue (and be expanded to include services of value to academic psychologists); the lobbying finances and work of the practice directorate will remain administratively separate to meet legal requirements. There will be no dues increase for 3 years.
